#### TRUST BEGINS "GREEN BELT"

The dream of an Easthampton Green Belt moved two steps closer to reality in 1983, as the Pascommuck Conservation Trust, Inc. purchased the former Warner Parcel on East Street and has accepted an offer for a six acre parcel off West Street.

Acquisition of the two environmentally important parcels by the Trust would be the first steps toward formation of an undeveloped strip along the Manhan as contained in the town's 1970 Master Plan and 1982 Open Space and Recreation Plan.

Both parcels are valuable as watershed and floodplain land. Their ability to store flood water every spring protects valuable personal property along the river from flooding.

October 5th, the Board of Directors voted to pay the \$1,405 balance of the \$2,000 price of the 4.8 acre Warner Parcel on East Street adjacent to the Daughters of the American Revolution Monument. Transfer of the deed from the Connecticut River Watershed Council is expected shortly.

Work parties have cleared and mowed the East Street frontage and a committee headed by Director Bob Pinkos has begun work on a sign to be erected there. It will bear the inscription: Old Pascommuck Conservation Area, with the Trust's name beneath.

Liability insurance up to \$300,000 on the Warner Parcel has been purchased. One year's premium cost \$200.00.

#### BOYLE DONATES LAND

On November 9th the Board of Directors unanimously agreed to accept the gift of a six acre parcel of land off Meadowbrook Drive bordering the Manhan River from developer Jim Boyle.

The land, which promises to be the next land acquisition by the Trust, is located behind homes being built by Mr. Boyle.


Mr. Boyle acquired the land as part of a larger parcel several months ago from the Northampton Institute for Savings. He will build several houses on developable parts of the property, leaving portions by the river undeveloped. The land was formerly owned by the estate of the late Richard Truehart.

Because the land floods each spring, and is restricted by an Order of Conditions approved by the town's Conservation Commission, the land is not suitable for development.

The land could be used for farming, and its rental to a farmer for a small fee is possible, according to Director Michael Tautznik, who has been negotiating with Mr. Boyle for the land since he acquired it from the Truehart estate.

The Trust would be required to pay only a small closing fee (about \$100) to acquire the land. It should become part of the Trust's land inventory during the first quarter of 1984.

With the acquisition of both parcels, the Trust can look forward to connecting the two with other parcels which lie between them. The result could be an unbroken line of undeveloped land in the public domain for future generations to enjoy.


The history of the pond an its deterioration through the process of eutrophication was explained to the more than 300 people who took the tour. The pond could and SHOULD be saved by the town which has the option to purchase the pond from owner J.P.Stevens Co. for \$1.00.

The tour was such a success that the Trust has been invited by the Easthampton Bicentennial Commission to sponsor similar tours of the pond as part of the town's bicentennial celebration in 1985.

At the corresponding trade show at Easthampton High School, the Trust booth provided information and photographs of the Trust and its work.

Director Bill Burgart's photograph cards were unveiled at the show, with more than 30 orders for the stunning, rich-hued nature photographs taken.

More than \$100 was raised at the festival from donations and the sale of food items at the pond tours. Director Bill Carroll graciously donated the \$21 he won in a raffle at the Festival to the Trust.
